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Get Outside and Learn Captivates Kids

We have a process for encouraging learning during the school year, but what do you do during the summer? Every August through May, Club members have Power Hour rotations scheduled Monday through Thursday.



Power Hour is where members have a quiet space to work on learning-related activities (or homework, if assigned) with the dedicated assistance of program staff. On average, 87% of the 495 members surveyed said that Power Hour is meeting their needs. From June to August, our rising third through fifth graders enjoy Get Outside and Learn (or G.O.A.L.), an adaptation of an earlier program called The Walking Classroom. Members vote as a group to choose a topic of interest. Then they listen to a podcast through headphones while being outside. G.O.A.L. takes advantage of the natural beauty of our Boys & Girls Club campus adjoining the County's park and the French Broad River. It gives the kids a chance to negotiate with each other to advocate for their favorite topic. Listening to one another and giving space for differing opinions is a good life skill to have. It also gives kids a stress-free way to explore new ideas and talk about them together.

Club kids can listen and learn wherever they want to (under the supervision of staff) but it has to be outside for G.O.A.L.!



Summer Training and Summer Fun

Before we could get to the fun of summer with our 300 kids and teens enrolled, we needed to get down to the serious business of training. Fortunately, all of our summer program staff returned from either the school year or a prior summer. That meant we could go the extra mile to use an idea we learned from Shania Powell, School Social Worker at Rosman Elementary, Middle, and High School, and T.C. Henderson Elementary School of Science and Technology. The idea is "connection mapping." We posted the name of every child and teen on our Club walls and asked program staff to identify if they

have a close enough relationship where the child or teen would feel comfortable seeking them out for guidance or advice. Our cohort of 110 teens flipped this same exercise on its head. They shared back to us their names of mentors, leaders, advisors, pastors, parents/caregivers.or friends...someone in their lives they can turn to when they need support. This exercise brought attention to the places where we have connections within our Boys & Girls Club community and highlighted where we need to build connections through intentional outreach to fortify resources for wellbeing.

On to More Fun... The teens are enjoying splitting time between Stanback Hall on Brevard College's beautiful campus and our Clubhouse. The Club's garden provides more than just carrots. A bountiful harvest leads to smiles.



Some of our teens are engaging in the *Work-based Learning Program* which allows us to compensate the participants for time spent doing service hours at the Club and participating in targeted Club programming. One such teen said it is "a dream come true" to work at the Boys & Girls Club.
